LADIES AND GENTLEMEN

1. Allow me to express my deepest gratitude to the organisers of this conference and indeed the members of the Southern Africa Association of Educational Assessment (SAAEA) for the invitation to officiate at this august research conference. International gatherings like this one provide a rare opportunity for key players in the education sector to pause, reflect, and consciously ponder on educational issues and challenges from different perspectives. Distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen, "Quality Assessment in an Era of Educational Reforms" is not only timely, but has obvious relevance to us as a country, region, continent and indeed the world over. Transforming into knowledge-based societies, which many of our countries aspire for, depends to a very large extent on the capacity of our education systems to deliver learners equipped with 21<sup>st</sup> century skills. The existence of such skills can only be verified through effective assessment. Assessment should also be viewed as a tool of accountability of any education system to the nation. It is through effective assessment that the quality of an education system can be accurately measured and established. Last but not least, feedback obtained through assessment can be used for the purpose of quality improvement. It is only a system that creates a judicious balance between curriculum, learning and assessment that can lead to positive national transformation. It is my hope that as you deliberate on these complex issues over the next

three days, you come up with solutions and suggestions that we may implement to improve our education systems.

5. Director of Ceremonies, as I stated earlier in my address, we consider assessment to be an integral part of the quality agenda of any educational system. It is therefore part of a broad strategy to achieve especially the UN Sustainable Development Goal 4 that seeks to ensure “inclusive and equitable education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all”. At continental level, assessment forms part of the Africa Agenda 2063 - the “Africa we Want”, whose Continental Education Strategy for Africa (CESA) sets out to establish a “qualitative system of education and training to provide the African continent with efficient human resources adapted to African core values...” Closer home and fitting very neatly into the above global and continental framework is the SADC Protocol on Education and Training that promotes cooperation among member states to ensure that policies and programmes that support equitable and quality education are harmonised and standardised. Given all these, SAAEA could not have chosen a more appropriate conference theme.

6. Director of Ceremonies, I could go on and on about how relevant this Conference theme and its sub-themes are to the education agenda. I am however fully aware that educationists have other interests. In fact in the process of developing a wholesome human being out of a child, we know that sport, learning about nature, and historical sightseeing are important; they refresh the mind and prepare it for learning more and more. I am therefore aware that at the end of the day when all that is education and assessment has been said and done, you would want to unwind and see if Gaborone can offer anything more.
